Society, designing and presenting her own hands-on Knee-high Nature Programs for libraries and elementary schools throughout Vermont and compiling Vermont's Rare Bird Alert for five

vears for the Vermont Center for Ecostudies.

Feb 18 (Sat) Nick Baer (526-8233) We will be hiking from 4A to Wilmot Center (SRK trail 7) which takes us over Bog Mountain. We will spend some time on the hike looking for animal tracks and talk about adaptations animals have to survive our NH winters. The total hike distance is 4.6 miles and we will start at 4A where it intersects School House Road, and end at the library parking lot in Wilmot Center. Hikers should plan for winter hiking and bring warm layers, snowshoes, lunch/snacks and water. The hike is rated moderate due to the distance and winter conditions. We will meet at the North Wilmot Library at 9:00am, and we will shuttle hikers to the hike start at the intersection of 4A and School House Road. If interested please call Nick Baer at 603-526-8233. This Winter's First Hike

On January 14, Nick Baer led the first winter hike of the season. Joining him were, Gerry Gold, Tom Lawton, Ed McLeod, Holly Borday, and Nick's dog, Morgan. The plan for the day was to hike to the top of Kearsarge via the Lincoln trail and hike down on the Wilmot side. It was a partially cloudy day with temperatures in the high teens with a strong NNW

wind. Nick describes the day, "Luckily the Lincoln trail kept us out of the wind for most of the hike, and it wasn't until we approached the summit that we were in the wind. We made the decision to alter our hike itinerary to avoid the icy descent on the Barlow trail heading to the Winslow State Park. So, we hiked up and down the Lincoln trail which made for an 8.4-mile up and down hike" as opposed to the advertised distance of 6.1 miles.

The group was agreeable to the change in plans if it meant less time slipping on

ice. Microspikes were very helpful for the top third of the trail as there were parts of the trail that were quite icy. "It was a great group of folks with good conversation and a steady pace with only brief rests. We left the trail head at approximately 9:15 am and returned to our vehicles at 4:15 pm." A bonus of the hike included meeting a potential new board member from the town of Goshen, Tom Lawton. "It was a great opportunity to get to know Tom who expressed an interest in joining the board. Gerry spoke with him and invited him to our next board meeting. Tom is an avid hiker and outdoor enthusiast." Nick will be leading another hike on February 18.
