2017 Annual Meeting Sunday March 12th "Birds of Prey" featuring Nick Baer of Colby-Sawyer College

The Annual SRKG Meeting will be held at Our Lady of Fatima Church in New London on Sunday March 12th. Dr. Nick Baer, Chair of the Natural Sciences Department at Colby-Sawyer College, will present a program "Birds of Prey"

exploring the diversity of raptors in New England. Nick will discuss the key characteristics of local hawks to help us identify these fascinating creatures and teach us where and when to look for them. He will also explain the varied behaviors and survivorship strategies of these hunters of the sky, from huge Bald Eagles to the much smaller American Kestrel.

Nick's interest in hawks began in 1996 when he first volunteered to help with a bird banding project. As he walked out in the field he saw someone holding two peregrine falcons while another falcon was being removed from a net. Nick remembers telling the other participants, "I don't know what you are doing, but I want to be part of this for the rest of my life." Indeed, he has been volunteering at the Cape May



Raptor Banding Project Inc. since then, banding birds every fall during the migration to learn more about their populations. Nick has recognized the importance o f introducing this effort to the next generations, so they will continue the progress. His own children are now helping with the project and Nick's college students are studying how these birds may transport pathogens like the West Nile Virus during their migrations.

Weaving the Green Necklace by Dan Allen

Part II of a series of articles exploring the origin and early history of the SRKG.

At the first public meeting of people interested in a "green necklace around Lake Sunapee" there were two principle interests. Some saw the establishment of a trail as the key to enticing landowners' understanding of the importance of their land in the necklace. Some of those, interested only in land preservation, dropped out of the nascent organization. Early participants I recall were Paul Gravested, Dave Anderson, Peter Sabin, Dick Martin, Cynthia Bruss, Bill Hoffman, Bill Best, and George Howe. George believed the structure should provide each town autonomy and responsibility for securing landowner trail agreements, ragging, cutting and maintaining its trails. The overall organization at the start was, as it is now, representative, with a Chairman chosen each year by the board of directors. The Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway was incorporated in 1993. Tax exempt status was obtained soon after. No one jumped up to volunteer as the first Chairman. I thought the best qualified person was Bill Best. He demurred, and I was chosen. It was a post I held for three years until I convinced the board that the office should rotate among town representatives. Bill was the second Chairman.

The Greenway engaged the services of Burnham Martin through a National Park Service grant. He drove down monthly from Brunswick, ME, to offer assistance as part of a national trail assistance program.

The first Walkabout was held on September 23, 24, 25, & 26, 1994. Three of us, Dick Martin, Bill Best, and I, completed, with much of it in the rain. Cynthia Bruss, Burnham Martin, Debbie Perkins, and several others, joined us for part of the walkabout.


People wanted maps and a guidebook. My wife, Natalie Davis, pushed the issue. Bill Best was insistent that trail agreements came first. After several years of stumbling along the guidebook was given serious help by Brian Faughnan who did map development and book compilation. Loa Winter volunteered drawings for inclusion.

Were there any serious disagreements? The only one I can remember was over responsibility for the Lincoln Trail, which was built by students at Kearsarge Regional High School under the guidance of Lincoln Cleveland. The trail crossed one private ownership and entered the Mount Kearsarge State Forest. Trail agreements had been obtained by the high school. The Sutton representatives thought that the Trail should become their responsibility, and I thought the Greenway should let the High School be responsible with the Greenway offering its assistance. Many years there was no one at the high school who took on the job. For awhile Natalie and I were the volunteer maintainers. When the Sutton Reps asked the board for a stand on the issue, I counted the votes, and dropped out.

Unfortunately, the Greenway has a long way to go to become a preserved necklace. There are some trail agreements, but most of those include a drop dead clause (the agreement can be cancelled on short notice by either party). Worse yet, a significant portion of the Greenway is still on roads. Road walking is necessary near the two crossings under Interstate 89.
